Our presiding preacher last Sunday was Juan Manuel Arias Perea, a divinity student at the Lutheran School of Theology in Chicago. He comes from a long line of pastors of the Lutheran Reformed Church in Cuba where he served as pastor in a rural parish for 5 years. He and Javier share their gratitude for their time with us, and appreciated the warm reception they received from the congregation.

This Sunday we welcome Dr. John Roberts to our pulpit. John is the Director of Music of The Lee Chapel AME Church in Auburn, AL. Their worship services are a combination of live, SKYPE and Facebook Live presentation. He is also the Pianist of Waterloo First United Methodist Church where several of us were able to attend his presentation on African American interpretation of hymnody on their Mardi Gras Sunday.

He is the Dean Emeritus of The School of Liberal Arts and Sciences having retired from Ivy Tech Community College of Indiana - Columbus Region in 2014. He began playing for the Children's Choir of The Mt. Olive Missionary Baptist Church, Louisville, KY (pastored by his granduncle, Rev. Dr. James L. Roberts, Sr.) in September 1957. While in undergraduate school at Morehead State University, Morehead, KY, in 1968 he became the first pianist & organist for the MSU Black Gospel Ensemble which celebrated its 55th Anniversary this year. He has served during his 66 year career as a church musician in nine congregations of various denominations. His philosophy is "Music is non denominational, music is the thread which keeps the denominational quilt together."

CHURCH ROW NEIGHBORHOOD ACTION TEAMS

Over the years, several groups have joined forces to address needs in our Historic Church Row Neighborhood. More recently, Habitat for Humanity has targeted this area for housing builds and rehab. They have also been partnering with churches and community residents to improve the quality of life in our neighborhood. As part of this process, they are organizing action teams for addressing four areas:

1.Social (communication & trust)

2.Structural and Safety (street lights, sidewalks, speed bumps, etc)

3. Housing and Physical Environment (trash, rentals, rehabs, new houses)

4.Park and Beautification (renovating a park)

The role of the Social Action Teams is to study needs in the neighborhood that residents identify as priorities, and explore options for addressing them. The immediate neighborhood will be represented by at least 2 people who live in Church Row. Other participants are representatives of neighborhood churches, businesses, and staff of the City of Waterloo. Each team will meet monthly from July 2023-June 2024 to work on specific goals and objectives in those action areas. Partners will get the opportunity to come alongside neighbors and assist in these areas where neighbors would like to see change. This is an opportunity for our church to work more directly with those living in the neighborhood to positively influence our neighborhood.
