



PASTOR'S CORNER

This piece of visual art is called "Tree of Life" by Sharon Cummings.

One of the things I love about art is how it can affect all of us differently. We see in it what makes sense to us in our own time and place. Perhaps tomorrow we might think differently about it, or even an hour from now. Art speaks to our inner being, asking us to make sense of what we experience.

Today, I like this piece for several reasons. The colors are vibrant and provide a kaleidoscopic buffet for the eyes. The title expresses a religious theme, and encourages us to remember the story of Eden in the Bible. But yet it is a different kind of tree than what we may have construed that tree to be. It asks us to use our imaginations to consider what this tree of life means to us in our time.

I pray daily for peace in this world. I never tire of wanting a world where we can all get along in love, peace, and justice — no matter our color, ethnicity, religious persuasion, nationality, or any other distinguishing characteristic. At this time

of Olympics, I root for all the athletes, and enjoy learning about their stories. That they can come from all over this good earth, compete, and get along in the Olympic Village and also in competition is a remarkable testament to the human spirit. They seem to push each other to excel — to reach for the best they can do. And while only one person gets the gold medal, they all treasure becoming their best selves. And sometimes they also appreciate that others have done this, too.

Yesterday, I saw an awards ceremony for one of the events, skateboarding I think it was, and the silver medalist's expression of respect for the gold medalist as his medal was being delivered was encouraging. He had lost getting the gold medal, perhaps only by a bit, but had a sense of both congratulations and reverence for what his opponent had achieved. So often we only focus on what is visible, or even most visible — e.g., the first places, not the seconds, thirds, tenths, and 125ths. We see in this piece of art the tree and its limbs, colorful with both branches and flowers, and think how beautiful and magnificent it is. But below are the roots, the life-giving force, that sustains what is visible. Each of these athletes in the Olympics have spent countless hours in training for their events. Their training is the invisible roots that allow them to perform at such a high level. As I see these athletes compete, I recall my days in sports as a teenager, and compare my abilities with theirs. It is humbling that when I was at my very best, I would not come close to measuring up to these star athletes. Yet, in my life, as in theirs, is an unseen history that may not be visible to those who see them perform. And often it is not the end result that is as meaningful as the dedication of pursuing excellence along the journey.

There is a beauty to our lives that only we know; we who have lived through every moment of our lives — who have seldom attained victory, more often suffered defeat, and most usually ended up somewhere in between. This is life. It is that which nurtures and sustains us, gives us our roots, and feeds our spirits. People may only see what is above ground and visible in our lives, and hopefully what they see will be beautiful. But sometimes the real beauty is what lies beneath the surface.

What are the trees of life, branches of beauty, and flowers of fragrance in our lives? And what are the roots that make these truly alive for us in our relationship to others? May we all find ways of being the tree of life to those who may be blessed by our presence.
