PASTOR'S CORNER

REEVALUATING OUR PRIORITIES IN AN AGE OF SPIRITUALITY

Serenity is overrated when injustice is present.

Finding peace within oneself while others are suffering is gross negligence.

That is not spirituality, but transcendent egoism. It is not religiously inspired faith, but hedonistically manifested self-justification.

When my contentment requires my apathy about your condition, my turning a blind eye to your travails, then I have broken the covenant of caring and compassion that is between us.

I cannot be happy while you are sad if I am an empathetic person. I cannot feel fulfilled if I see that you are languishing.

I cannot enjoy my perceived accomplishments if you were not given a fair chance to attain the same. Your welfare is tied up with mine, and it is only the unethical who can focus on their own interests by ignoring those of others.

We are social animals, and our proper destiny is being in right relationship with one another. We defy our humanity when we put our own interests above those of others. We renounce the best that is within us when we seek our own good over and above the good of others.

What is sacred about each one of us is our ability to feel, think, speak, and act compassionately. Compassion is the divine virtue implanted within us that we must plant, cultivate, water, and let it see the light of day in our lives.

All the world religions attest to this truth. Compassion is the Golden, the Platinum, and all other Rules that require us to have as much empathy for others as we have for ourselves. It rests upon a spiritual understanding that we are all one and interrelated.

Compassion always seeks to establish distributive justice between us all; a desire and determination to let goodness be parceled out equitably among all beings. It is to recognize where inequalities exist, and to be impassioned to correct the reality where some are not treated with the same respect and love as others.

Compassion tends first to the needs of those hurting most, and will walk with another in pain rather than saunter on one's own way in blissful isolation. Compassion, like religion, requires community. While we can be spiritual all by ourselves, compassion requires that we look out for one another -- starting with the least among us.

We are not here to achieve our own enlightenment, heaven, or nirvana independently of others. Such a state is unworthy of its characterization if we all can't find our way there, or if any is excluded or deemed as hopeless. Bodhisattvas, Christs, and other great teachers have shown us that it is not about our own welfare, but the welfare of all, that is to prod our ethical actions and spread the generosity of our compassion. Creating beloved community, not sublime self-transformation, is to be our ultimate goal.

We are not here to isolate ourselves from the unruly and callous of heart and evil of action, but to show each and every one how there is a better way. We are not to disassociate from the mean-spirited and apathetic, as tempting as that may be; but to engage in acts of loving-kindness, empathetic care, and virtuous motivations that will reveal the blessings of mutual compassion.

We are not here to find a way to extinguish our own suffering through disengagement from the world and our relationships. We are here to create and build beautiful relationships in which we are fully engaged in the joys and sorrows of our fellow beings; where we will "suffer with" (the literal meaning of compassion) others and celebrate their joys together in relationship because we value our connection even more than our independence.

We are to value our interdependence more than we value our personal fulfillment. We are not to see only ourselves as the "end all, be all" of the universe, but rather see how all things are interconnected with one another, and how we need to give and receive in accordance with our need to bless and be blessed.

Our age's greatest temptation, by both the uncouth and the supposedly enlightened, is to put our wellbeing above that of others -- whether in pursuing wealth, power, and influence; or serenity, enlightenment, and personal salvation.

Blessings that only exist for us and not for others are unworthy of our pursuits. They are indicators of our own selfishness and greed, our own hubris and sense of superiority. Until we see such priorities as being unethical and unspiritual, we will not see the blessing that is rooted within us -- that divinity of being waiting to grow forth from our souls to be shared with one and all: the virtue of compassion.
